

Children's Moment

As Jesus walked along, he saw a man blind from birth. His disciples asked him, "Rabbi, who sinned, this man or his parents, that he was born blind?" Jesus answered, "Neither this man nor his parents sinned; he was born blind so that God's works might be revealed in him. We must work the works of him who sent me while it is day; night is coming, when no one can work. As long as I am in the world, I am the light of the world." When he had said this, he spat on the ground and made mud with the saliva and spread the mud on the man's eyes, saying to him, "Go, wash in the pool of Siloam" (which means Sent). Then he went and washed and came back able to see. The neighbors and those who had seen him before as a beggar began to ask, "Is this not the man who used to sit and beg?" Some were saying, "It is he." Others were saying, "No, but it is someone like him." He kept saying, "I am he." But they kept asking him, "Then how were your eyes opened?" He answered, "The man called Jesus made mud, spread it on my eyes, and said to me, 'Go to Siloam and wash.' Then I went and washed and received my sight." They said to him, "Where is he?" He said, "I do not know."

They brought to the Pharisees the man who had formerly been blind. Now it was a Sabbath day when Jesus made the mud and opened his eyes. Then the Pharisees also began to ask him how he had received his sight. He said to them, "He put mud on my eyes. Then I washed, and now I see." Some of the Pharisees said, "This man is not from God, for he does not observe the Sabbath." Others said, "How can a man who is a sinner perform such signs?" And they were divided. So they said again to the blind man, "What do you say about him? It was your eyes he opened." He said, "He is a prophet."

The Jews did not believe that he had been blind and had received his sight until they called the parents of the man who had received his sight and asked them, "Is this your son, who you say was born blind? How then does he now see?" His parents answered, "We know that this is our son and that he was born blind, but we do not know how it is that now he sees, nor do we know who opened his eyes. Ask him; he is of age. He will speak for himself." His parents said this because they were afraid of the Jews, for the Jews had already agreed that anyone who confessed Jesus to be the Messiah would be put out of the synagogue. Therefore his parents said, "He is of age; ask him."

So for the second time they called the man who had been blind, and they said to him, "Give glory to God! We know that this man is a sinner." He answered, "I do not know whether he is a sinner. One thing I do know, that though I was blind, now I see." They said to him, "What did he do to you? How did he open your eyes?" He answered them, "I have told you already, and you would not listen. Why do you want to hear it again? Do you also want to become his disciples?" Then they reviled him, saying, "You are his disciple, but we are disciples of Moses. We know that God has spoken to Moses, but as for this man, we do not know where he comes from." The man answered, "Here is an astonishing thing! You do not know where he comes from, yet he opened my eyes. We know that God does not listen to sinners, but he does listen to one who worships him and obeys his will. Never since the world began has it been heard that anyone opened the eyes of a person born blind. If this man were not from God, he could do nothing." They answered him, "You were born entirely in sins, and are you trying to teach us?" And they drove him out.

Jesus heard that they had driven him out, and when he found him he said, "Do you believe in the Son of Man?" He answered, "And who is he, sir? Tell me, so that I may believe in him." Jesus said to him, "You have seen him, and the one speaking with you is he." He said, "Lord, I believe." And he worshiped him. Jesus said, "I came into this world for judgment, so that those who do not see may see and those who do see may become blind." Some of the Pharisees who were with him heard this and said to him, "Surely we are not blind, are we?" Jesus said to them, "If you were blind, you would not have sin. But now that you say, 'We see,' your sin remains."

In seven verses, the gospel writer tells us that a man born blind is given sight. But after that, the narrator devotes thirty-three verses to the details of disagreement that swell after the healing takes place. I used to find this second part of the story tedious and exhausting. In a world with constant conflict, I'm tired of listening

to endless bickering. However, this second half of the story makes me realize that this encounter is hardly about physical healing or literal blindness. It's about how harmful theology can prevent us from seeing people—truly seeing them. It's about how our narrow imagination can harden into accusation and blame. It's about how we can be threatened by new ideas or shifts in someone's identity. It's about how our doctrine can lead to exile. Ultimately, it's a story about our resistance to change. Can this be a cautionary tale for us? In this image, hands expressing denial and exclusion press in on the man. In the background, I wrote a barrage of questions I imagine emerging from the crowd: Why did God heal you? What did you do to cause this? Who sinned? Alongside those questions, I wove in contemporary statements I've heard spoken in situations when we think a tidy rationale will comfort us: Everything happens for a reason. God only gives you as much as you can handle. Pray harder. I wonder what this story would look like had better questions been asked. What if his neighbors had instead asked the blind man, "How do you feel?" What if the man had asked the crowd, "What are you afraid of?" What if the Pharisees had asked one another, "What if it's time to change?" Surrounded by remnants of narrow vision, the man has new insight. He looks beyond the words, beyond the crowd, beyond the accusations driving him out of town. Can we seek understanding without denigrating or objectifying humans in the process?

Daily Devotional for Lent Week Four: Who sinned?

Journal or meditate on these questions each day.

<u>Sunday March 19</u>: How do you describe God?

Prayer: Holy God, there are so many names for you. How could I use just one? I could call you Friend, Healer, Creator, Teacher. The list goes on. As I move through Lent and continue to read your stories, remind me that you are bigger than my imagination. For that, I give thanks. Amen.

<u>Monday March 20</u>: In John 9, the disciples make assumptions about the reason for a man's blindness. When have you made an assumption? How have you changed your mind?

Prayer: God of patience, changing my mind can be like a slow and painful journey of dismantling and reassembling furniture in my mind. Scripture reminds us that holiness can be found in changing our minds. Help me see where I may need to dismantle and reassemble, and guide me. Amen.

<u>Tuesday March 21</u>: Connecting sin with disease was something the disciples had to unlearn (John 9). What are you trying to unlearn?

Prayer: God, I have stereotypes to unlearn. I have negative self-talk to unlearn. I have to unlearn the societal message that my worth comes from my productivity. There are so many messages in my head that do not come from you. Unravel those messages, and pull me back toward your embrace. Amen.

Wednesday March 22: Where in your life do you need healing?

Prayer: Healing God, I could use your help today. There are things that I carry, things that I wrestle with, things that bring a heaviness to my life. If you can, offer healing. Bind yourself to the broken parts of me. Smear mud on my eyes. Call me by name. Heal what hurts. With hope I wait, amen.

<u>Thursday March 23</u>: The disciples seek answers and clarity from Jesus. What answers do you seek?

Prayer: Omnipotent God, I have dozens of questions bubbling up inside me—how, and why, and for how long? I know your love is not a magic eight ball, spitting out pithy answers to the world's wonderings, so I will keep bringing my questions to you. I will keep asking. I will keep seeking, and I trust that you will meet me in the middle. With hope for your promised day I pray, amen.

<u>Friday March 24</u>: Jesus heals a blind man who then professes his faith saying, "Lord, I believe" (John 9). What do you believe—about yourself, and about God?

Prayer: Gracious God, I am always inspired when I hear other people say, "Lord, I believe." It makes me ask myself—what do I believe—about you, about community, about myself? I believe that you are a gracious and loving God. I believe that I am held in your embrace. Give me faith, like the man born blind, to carry that conviction and believe for all of my days. Amen.

Saturday March 25: The healed man is isolated from his community due to his faith in Jesus (John 9). Where and when has your faith felt like something that isolates you? When has it connected you?

Prayer: Jesus of Nazareth, you never said that being a person of faith would be easy. In today's world, being a person of faith can feel isolating. However, it also ties me to community. Help me always remember that you are with me. I am never alone. Amen.
