

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Our bulletin cover art was inspired by today's scripture. Here are the artist's reflections:

"Rubble" by Carmelle Beaugelin Conté crayon, charcoal, acrylic, paprika paste, cinnamon

It has been over a decade since my family in Haiti experienced the most traumatic earthquake in the nation's history. If you were to Google, "Haiti" and "earthquake," images of collapsed concrete and rubble would emerge. The most disturbing images are those of survivors, covered in white and gray ash and rubble, reaching out for rescuers to salvage them

from collapsed buildings. Endless images are found on the internet of arms stretched out, identity-less faces of horror covered in soot, and faces frozen into expressions of despair by the spectating photographer's lens. When I think of Ezekiel and the story of the dry bones, I think of those images. I've often heard sermons where pastors position God's people as the prophet to call the world into life, but what about God's people who are, as the bones, facing the despair of death? Their suffering is theologized away by those who consider themselves the righteous "Ezekiels" of the world, whose privilege weighs heavy on the bones of the suffering, like the concrete rubble in Haiti. "Rubble" speaks to the realities of being made alive and yet not being allowed to live—a nameless multitude of God's people resurrected yet still bearing the scent of burial spices on their bodies. Who are we in this story? Are we the bones seeking life? Do we perceive ourselves as spectators of suffering? Or will we choose to be participants in healing as active agents of God's resurrecting power out of the rubble?

Daily Devotional for Lent Week Five: Can these bones live?

Journal or meditate on these questions each day.

Sunday March 26: Where do you find peace?

Prayer: God of peace, it's not often that I slow down to think about the things that truly calm my spirit and anchor me to you. However, with the world threatening to run us ragged, I have to ask: what is it that brings me peace? How do I find it? How do I hold onto it? Help me sift through the pieces of my life to recognize what truly brings me peace so that even in hard seasons, these bones may live. Amen.

Monday March 27: What do you worry about?

Prayer: Jesus of Nazareth, I imagine that you worried. I imagine you worried about your friend Lazarus and whether or not he would be okay. I imagine you worried about returning to Jerusalem and what would happen when you did (John 11). Maybe worry is a symptom of love, but it is not a symptom that you let control you. So give me the courage to recognize my worries and to continue moving forward, just as you did. With hope I pray, amen.

<u>Tuesday March 28</u>: When all seems lost, how do you hold onto hope?

Prayer: God, some days feel like dead bone days. Like Ezekiel in the desert, I'm not sure these bones can live (Ezekiel 37). I'm not sure anything good can come from those days. When those days come, remind me that you are a God who breathes life into dust. May I rest in that promise. Amen.

Wednesday March 29: Jesus weeps for his friend Lazarus (John 11). What grief do you carry?

Prayer: Jesus, friend of Lazarus, Lent has a way of stirring up the grief we carry from year-to-year. Lent brings to mind the various endings in our life—the end of relationships, identities, seasons, and opportunities. Remind us that you know what that grief feels like, which means we are not alone in the heaviness of it all. Thank you for the companionship. Amen.

<u>Thursday March 30</u>: Even though it is dangerous for Jesus to go to Judea, he goes in order to be with his friend Lazarus (John 11). Who in your life has gone that extra mile for you? Who would you walk the extra mile for?

Prayer: Holy God, my life would not be complete without friends and family. When I look back over the years, it is the memories created with the people I love that give me the greatest joy. Help me cherish that for the sacred gift that it is. Thank you for my people, God. Amen.

<u>Friday March 31</u>: What makes you weary?

Prayer: God, is there truth embedded in my weariness? Is there something for me to learn from the exhaustion that knows my name? Show me how to be gentle with myself. Show me how to sift through my weariness, and how to lift my eyes when the yoke is heavy, so that I can find you in my midst. Amen.

<u>Saturday April 1</u>: What relationships matter most to you in this season?

Prayer: Triune God, from the very beginning you wired us for friendship, for community, for belonging. And yet, relationships are so hard! Vulnerability and trust can take so long! Give me an open heart to pour into the people in my life that mean the most to me. Do not let me withhold my care, but instead, may the love I feel for those who matter the most to me draw me closer and closer to you. Amen.
